### **CHOIR SEASON TO BEGIN - Come Join the Choir!**

It's choir season! Why not consider joining a choir and be a part of our vibrant music ministry. Our choirs sing and ring to God's glory. All are invited to be part of the music ministry.

Our choirs sing and ring a wide range of musical styles from baroque and classical to gospel and contemporary, all proclaiming the word of God. Your time and talents are always welcome.

If you are interested in joining one of the choirs, then we invite you to come and be a part of the music ministry and offer your gift of music to the glory of God.

<u>Senior Choir</u> – Our Senior Choir is open to adults who love to sing. We sing sacred music of all styles, with something for everyone. We rehearse weekly on <u>Thursdays from 6:00 - 7:00 pm in the Choir Room</u> and sing weekly during worship at church from September to June. We also sing at special services throughout the year. So come on down to the choir room <u>beginning Thursday</u>, <u>September 12th</u>. You may join us at anytime of the year.

<u>Youth Choir</u> — Our Youth Choir combines young people ages 7 through high school age. This choir sings once per month during worship from September to June and rehearses each <u>THURSDAY from 5:00-5:40 pm. in the Choir Room.</u>
<u>We will begin on Thursday, September 19<sup>th</sup>.</u>

We have had great groups of singers in the past who participated in many singing opportunities. God has truly

blessed these young voices and we invite more children and youth to become part of this great choir. We have had many former choir members continue in the field of music after graduation and are proud of that fact. Choristers learn the basics of music reading, vocal production and sing a variety of musical styles all proclaiming God's word.

<u>Cherub Choir -</u> Our little cherubs ages 3 and up (along with our Youth Choir Scholars) make wonderful music two times per year singing at the <u>Sunday morning service</u>, <u>before the Christmas Eve service</u> (<u>December 22<sup>nd</sup> this year at the 10 AM service</u>), as well as at the <u>Easter Sunday service</u> (<u>April 20</u>, <u>2025</u>). This choir is directed by Mrs. Thaxton and Mr. Noonan. Mrs. Thaxton will practice with the Cherub Choir, and parents too, after church on the three Sundays before they sing in worship. <u>Handbell Choir -</u> Our Handbell Choir, *The Village Ringers*, is an adult ringing group who have a great time making beautiful handbell music. This choir rings monthly at worship from September to May and rehearses each <u>Thursday from 7:15-8:30 PM in the Choir Room. We will begin on September 12<sup>th</sup>. There are also opportunities to perform solo, duet and quartet ringing in our worship services.</u>

We do not have any openings at this time but if you would like to be a substitute ringer, please contact Mike. Ringing experience is required. We ring at an intermediate level and <u>music reading is required.</u>

Please consider being part of the music ministry at church and join a choir. Membership is always open. Just contact Mike anytime throughout the year or stop by a rehearsal to listen. You are always welcome!

### Dear Congregational Church of No. Stonington,

As summer comes to a close, our students like so many around the world are preparing to go back to school. In Haiti school will be delayed until October because State exams were held late (August) and results are not yet published. This means that students who took exams for 9<sup>th</sup> grade do not yet know if they can move on to NS1, and NS4 students do not yet know if they can go on to college. However, some of our college students will begin this month, including Lokita who starts her 5<sup>th</sup> and final year at the American University of the Caribbean. Exciting stuff!


On a more serious note, our back to school budget is exceptionally high this year. With the gang violence in Haiti spreading, fewer goods are available throughout Haiti, but especially in the south were roads and ports are controlled by the gangs. School shoes that cost 500-1000 gourdes in the past now cost 3500, with similar increases in prices of everything from notebooks, pens to backpacks. Our schools also need additional desks, chairs and repairs to blackboards.

We are proud of our schools and ever more proud of our students. We strive to offer quality education and

continue to have a higher student success rate at State exams than other schools in our area. But, we need your help to continue. If you are able to help with back to school in any way, we will ensure that your dollars go far and directly to the education of our children. Any donation is a gift of hope and is so appreciated by us all.
